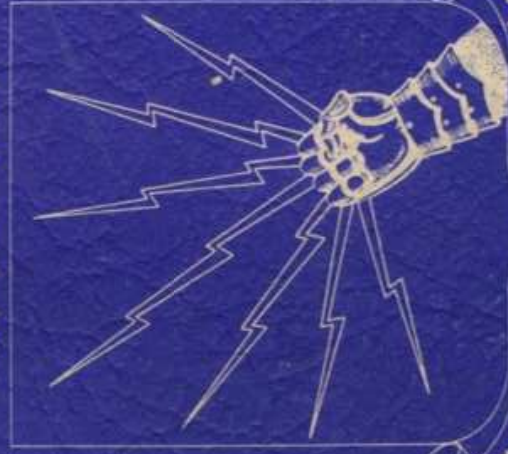


GET 'EM THERE AND GET 'EM BACK

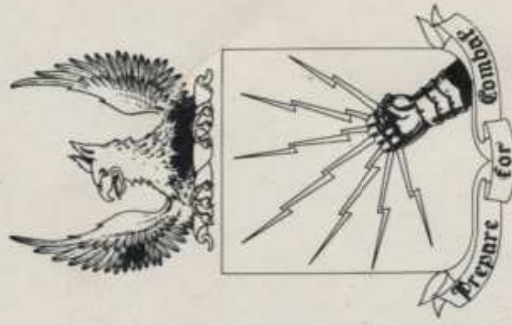
Reveille . . .
